Georgia First

What is the coverage gap?

- The coverage gap impacts about 500,000 Georgians across the state
- Individuals in the gap cannot afford private health insurance yet earn just above the threshold to qualify for Medicaid
- Georgians in the gap includes farmers, veterans, part-time, hourly, and gig workers and their families

What is the solution?

- PeachCare Plus
- Close the coverage gap through a free-market-based approach
- Georgians decide what works best for our health system
- Position Georgia to be a national leader in healthcare

Closing the Coverage Gap is Fiscally Responsible for Georgia.


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Closing the Coverage Gap Boosts the Economy & Grows the Middle Class.

- Spurs more than 51,000* new jobs statewide most not in health care
- Puts more money in the pockets of average Georgians nearly \$900* per household
- Grows our economy increases economic output by \$9.4 billion
- Reduces costs for everyone
 10% savings in premiums

Closing the Coverage Gap Will Boost the Economy in Georgia Mountain Counties.

3 years after closing the coverage gap, counties in the Georgia Mountains can expect to see an average increase of:

- 177 jobs
- \$31.1 million in economic output
- \$17.8 million in GDP
- \$13.8 million in personal income

Closing the Coverage Gap Helps Save Rural Hospitals.

- Hospital closures require residents to travel hours to access care, cause local job losses
- Closing the coverage gap provides higher, more reliable reimbursement for providers
- Incentivizes more primary care providers to rural areas of the state

Nine rural Georgia hospitals closed since 2005 Up to 18 more are now in danger

Closing the Coverage Gap Helps Reduce Infant and Maternal Death Rates.

- Georgia has one of the country's worst maternal death rates
- Coverage prevents needless deaths and illnesses, leading to healthier children
- Encourages more specialty doctors to rural areas; many counties don't have a single pediatrician or obstetrician

Closing the Coverage Gap Increases Access to Mental Health Services.


- Untreated mental illness can lead to crisis or crime
- Covering treatment shifts reliance away from overburdened emergency rooms, jails, and prisons
- Reduces burden on hard-working local law enforcement

Closing the Coverage Gap is Popular.

- Majority of people are more likely to vote for someone who supports closing the coverage gap
- Good health care policy and good economic policy
- Benefits not just those in need of coverage; it benefits all Georgians

60% support among Republicans

The Latest.

- First-ever legislative hearing in March
- Senate Committee tie vote; support from both Republicans and Democrats
- Comprehensive Health Coverage Study Commission to study the coverage gap with final report due by end of this year (*initial meeting held July 25*)
- Georgia Pathways 1115 waiver set to expire September 2025
